A world record between two Canadian figureheads might change the future of electric boating and watersports.

Voltari Marine Electric, the makers of the ultra sleek carbon fiber Voltari 260 Electric, partnered with the Canadian National Waterski Show Team to set a unique world record that's unlikely to be broken any time soon.

The premium electric boat was used by the ski team to execute the world's first waterskiing pyramid behind an electric boat. The team is based out of the well-known boating hotbed of Muskoka, Ontario and is led by SWS Muskoka.

"It's always great to be the first at something innovative, and especially when it's green, and Canadian," team captain Geordie Newlands told BoatBlurb. "I was very surprised with how well it performed. It's great to see a Canadian company being the leader in electrification of marine power."

For Voltari, "it was a chance to showcase the power of our new 260 model, which handled the eight-skier load beautifully," says CEO Cam Heaps in a press release. "We loved the combination of Canadian tech and Canadian athletic talent – it was an exhilarating moment."

The boat, a boutique high-performance 26-foot hull packs an impressive 740 horsepower. The 142 kW lithium battery bank also pumps out an astounding 1000 lb-ft of torque, which puts the Voltari 260 in elite company among electric boats. For waterskiiers, it provides a unique ride thanks to the increased torque at launch, not to mention an emissions-free ride that allows riders to maneuver in near total silence rather than behind a loud gas-powered engine.

The feat also proved to be a full-circle moment for Voltari Chief Technology Officer, Bruno Tellier. The company's breakthrough in marine EV started when Tellier bet a friend that he could engineer an electric boat with enough speed and power to waterski behind. Industry attempts at electric recreational boats had so far been underpowered and disappointing.

Voltari had to start from scratch, developing optimal hull and battery designs, new carbon fibre materials and power train systems. The result is a craft that's designed from the hull up to be fully electric.

Voltari has also been riding major momentum in recent months. They recently set another world record for longest distance on a single charge by crossing the Gulf Stream from Key Largo to Bimini in less than 20 hours. The 91 mile journey not only set the record for the longest and first-ever overseas trip in an electric vehicle, it also cemented them as a leading contender in the emerging market.

As for waterskiiers, the high performance EV boat is a game-changer.

"It's so powerful – it pulled us all off the dock with such ease," said Newlands. "We breathe a lot of exhaust behind the boats and there was none of that at all. And it's so quiet – makes for easy communication between the driver, the spotter and the skiers. It was a totally different experience and we loved it."

Both teams have plans to put Canada on the world stage in months to come; the Waterski Show Team at the upcoming world championships in Australia, and Voltari in a global marine market that's hungry for zero-emission, low-maintenance EV watercraft.

This clinic filled up quickly as Paul is one of the most experienced and respected coaches Canada has to offer and Dream Lake, site of the 2018 World Barefoot Championships, delivered great conditions for the clinic and the tournament. The entire barefoot community was glad to have Paul back on the scene. He elevated the performances of everyone who attended the clinic and showed he still has the skills when he competed on Saturday!

Two barefoot jump clinics were held at Pine Lake this summer to continue to develop new jumpers and improve our existing jumpers. The opportunity to barefoot jump is limited due to site & driver availability. These clinics paid big dividends at Nationals with several of the footers posting jump scores for the first time in their career or increasing their existing scores.

The 2023 Canadian Barefoot Championships were held on August 25<sup>th</sup>-27<sup>th</sup>, 2023, at Canal Soulanges in Les Cedres, Quebec. This site has hosted numerous events over the years. The organizing team led by Daniel Lariviere with the help of the Ontario organizers, once again delivered a world class event. Daniel (with help and support from his wife Chantel, family and parents worked diligently with the municipality of Les Cedres and local sponsors to gain access to the site and pull together a successful event. Special thanks to the Lariviere and Brunet families for providing their personal Sanger towboats. The format was adjusted to include clinic time on Friday with Canadian Team members Becky Meyer, Brem Allen, Marcel Burnet, Duane Godfrey, Gordie Croteau and Richard Gray providing coaching to many of the competitors. Also included was a boom division for up-and-coming competitors, a kneeboard challenge, as well as a "Boom Freestyle Event". The Boom Freestyle event was judged by spectators that were completely unencumbered by any knowledge of barefoot rules and just looking for the wow factor. The gold medal winners were:

Each season we try to get as many new disabled skiers on the water as possible. As more equipment and coaching becomes available, foundations are being laid for a sustainable adaptive water ski program here in Ontario. For the 2nd summer in a row, we hosted the Spinal Cord Injury Ontario "give it a go" day which once again was a huge success. We had perfect weather and a great crew on board with national team coaches Dave Wassill and Lisa Williams, as well as Skiability Ottawa's Chris Holden. Also on board were volunteers Jim Gardiner and Jeff Barnes who I ran a traveling show ski and ski school with back in the day. The clinic was hosted at Paul Roberts' Summer Ski lake which provided near perfect conditions for the camp.

We pulled 10 new skiers off the dock and had members of the national adaptive water ski team training at the site all week. It was a great opportunity for people to see the full spectrum of adaptive water skiing skills. A few of this year's participants shared how they had never been in the water swimming for a long time or were, in some cases, reluctant even to consider trying water skiing. But those thoughts changed when the freedom to try something new allowed them to explore a unique opportunity without limitations.

This camp not only provided an amazing experience for the new skiers, it's helped propel the national team to their silver medal podium finish at the world disabled water ski championships held in California in September. This was the highest team score Canada has ever received. If you think about it, we Canadians have a very short water ski season compared to our friends in the south. So these victories are huge accomplishments putting Canada on the world water ski stage. Saskatchewan's Blake Lamontagne managed to hit a PB in trick which was also a world record in his division.

There were some great new additions to the team as well as advancements in our equipment set up which will hopefully keep our country on the podium for years to come. Next season we plan to expand the camp to multiple locations across Ontario so keep an eye out in the spring for adaptive water ski programs.




